

	Program Purpose as Authorized in the Law	FY2017 & FY2018 Funding
Stephanie Tubbs Jones Child Welfare Services Program (CWS)	Formula grants to states, territories and tribes for child welfare-related services to children and their families	\$268.7 million

Limitations:

- Foster care maintenance, adoption assistance and child care limited to FY05 levels
- 10% limit on administration
- Not for medical or education costs


Planned Use of Federal CWS Funds





Promoting Safe and Stable Families Title IV-B, Subpart 2 - FY 2018 funding


- Child and Family Services (\$302M)
 - Formula grants to states, territories and tribes for four categories of services: family preservation, family support, time-limited family reunification, and adoption promotion and support.
- Targeted: Improve Caseworker Visits (\$19M)
- Targeted: Regional Partnership Grants to Improve Outcomes of Children Affected by Substance Abuse (Competitive -\$38M)
- Court Improvement Program (\$30M)
- Research, Training & TA (HHS \$9.6M)
- Kinship Navigator Grants (\$19M)




U.S. Federal Child Welfare Spending: SFY 2014 (\$12.8 billion)



IV-E Maintenance Payments

- "Foster care maintenance payments" means payments
 to cover the cost of (and the cost of providing) food,
 clothing, shelter, daily supervision, school supplies, a
 child's personal incidentals, liability insurance with
 respect to a child, reasonable travel to the child's
 home for visitation, and reasonable travel for the child
 to remain in the school in which the child is enrolled at
 the time of placement.
- In the case of institutional care, maintenance shall include the reasonable costs of administration and operation of such institution as are necessarily required to provide the items described in the preceding sentence.

Allowable Administrative Costs

- (1) Eligibility, fair hearings and appeals
- (2) The following are examples of allowable administrative costs necessary for the administration of the foster care program:
 - (i) Referral to services

(ii) Preparation for and participation in judicial determinations

- (iii) Placement of the child
- (iv) Development of the case plan
- (v) Case reviews
- (vi) Case management and supervision
- (vii) Recruitment and licensing of foster homes and institutions
- (viii) Rate setting
- (ix) A proportionate share of related agency overhead
- (x) Costs related to data collection and reporting



Selected States – FFY 2016







State/Local Funds

Some common factors in the amount of nonfederal funds used in child welfare:

- State's FMAP
- Penetration Rate
- 1996 AFDC Standard of Need
- Caseload Composition
- Array of Services
- State decisions to commit funds beyond federal matching or MOE requirements, etc.
